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Critical Problems for Youths' Education & Work Futures

- **1. Undiagnosed learning disabilities**
- 2. Possible depression and/or depressive symptomatology
- 3. Too few jobs and too few decent-paying jobs
- 4. Workforce development orientation to adults rather than youth
- 5. Federal funding changes under Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act of 2014 (WIOA)



What to Do? Think Differently about Solutions

Consider "postwork society" solutions – compensating many more kinds of work than are compensated in the regular labor market today.... (Kathi Weeks, 2011, *The Problem with Work*)

Consider "civil labor" that is rewarded by "civic money" (both dollar money and exchange)... (Ulrich Beck, 2000, *The Brave New World of Work*)



What Do "Postwork Society" & "Civil Labor" Solutions Look Like?

- **1.** Find out what the youth's passions are
- 2. Find funding to expand the natural computer "savvy" among youth
- 3. Align art-interested youth with social impact of arts movements – and build in physical exercise
- 4. Connect youth with STEM movements
